

Think Open

Different from previous versions

- It impacts not just the IT domain, but the entire organisation
- It links Commission policy goals to open source, making clear that a strategy encouraging open source is beneficial to the EC and the EU
- It establishes a programme office tasked with removing organisational barriers and commence a change management programme to establish an internal working culture based on the principles of open source
